PROPOSALS AS FORWARDED OUT ON THE STATUTES - TERMEND IN 2011

Suggested new version of article 16 (old article 14) of the statutes.

THE COMITE DIRECTEUR

1) **COMITE DIRECTEUR**
The CD consists of 16 members: The president, 10 active members and 5 suppliants.

2) **CANDIDATES**
The CD must propose 16 candidates of at least 7 different nationalities for its own succession. Every local board may present a maximum of 2 candidates.

3) **PRESIDENT**
The president of the CD is elected directly by the AGORA. Both the CD and the President's Conference must present a candidate. Every Regional Meeting may present a candidate.

4) **MEMBERS**
The 10 members and 5 suppliants are elected in one turn. Every vote is entitled to choose a maximum of 5 candidates. The candidates with the highest number of votes are elected. The five runners-up become suppliants.

5) **TERM**
All members of the CD are elected for one year; re-election is possible.

6) **MORAL REPORT**
All CD-members must present a short moral report at the end of their term.

IN A PAGE.

This issue is meant to be America-orientated. So I wrote an article myself using some magazines and newspapers to assist me.

Only a short time ago "Fortress Europe" was a threat to free trade in the eyes of the United States. Under President Bush a turning-point in this view seems to appear. The White House even recognizes that it needs a strong ally and lays some responsibilities in the hands of Europe. President Reagan would have named this heresy.

The idea that the European Economic Unity in 1992 would lead to a protectionist "Fortress Europe", was born in the States. So the burial of this idea has to take place in the USA too. President Bush called Jaques Delors the "architect of architects of the new Europe". In speeches during his European trip he even gave his full support to the European desire for economic and political unity. Why this turningpoint in the American view?

Most likely for this positive declarations towards 1992 and the EEC in general the answer lies in the changes in the view of the USA to its own position in the world. The responsibilities of the USA in the world put a heavy burden on its financial resources. So the US became very sensitive for every attack on its world-hegemony. The new team under Bush realizes that the USA can no longer afford the role of banker and policeman of the world. Especially in the wide scala of problems the States needs a strong ally. Problems ranging from the peaceproposals from Gorbatsjov and the reforms in Eastern Europe to the threat of the environment. Washington is building a multilateral frame of thinking.

The European Community is going to co-ordinate the western support to Eastern Europe. For Reagan Margaret Thatcher served as a Trojan horse in the EEC. The Paris-Bonn-axis is now of great value next to the 'special relation' with the United Kingdom.

The first ne responsibility will be the relations with the East. West-Europeans are not only highly interested in the road to economic integration in 1992, but also (and sometimes even more) in the relative, unknown road to more economic and political freedom in the East. To be-short, 1992 is economics, Eastern Europe is drama.

The desintegration of Eastern Europe is exactly the contrary of the integration in the West. It is the liberation from the uniformity of COMECON and Warsawpact imposed by the Soviet-Union, and the revival of nationalism in the Baltic States, Hungary, Poland and elsewhere that gives the best theatre.

Some people say that the rise of the extreme rightist parties in the European Parliament elections was a reaction, especially in the FRG, against the coming of Germans from Poland, GDR and USSR seen as a threat to the economy.

In the economic field 1992 will go on without doubt. But in how far is it possible that "Fortress Europe" will be a cultural one. Will the disappearance of internal borders, meant to encourage internal migration in the EEC, lead to build up new external barriers for immigration?

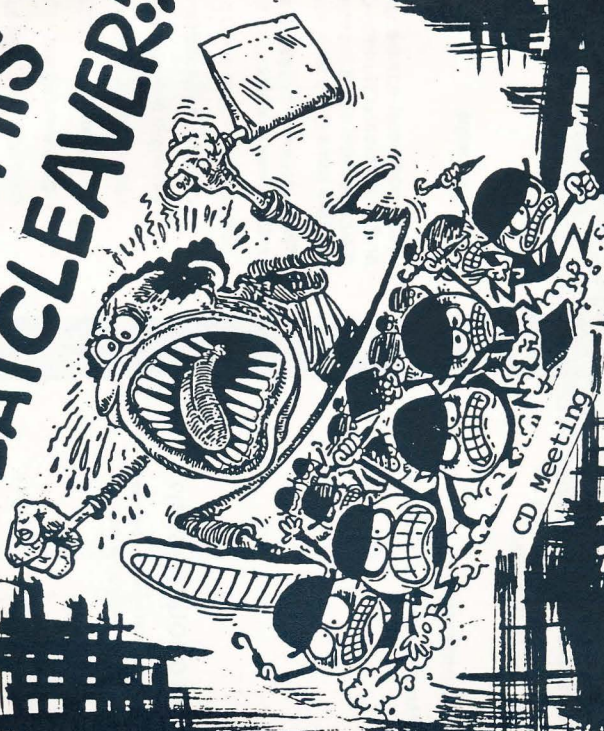

I would like to thank the organizers of the congress "EUROPE- the IDEA",
 in Heidelberg for the nice time we had there!
 However, there is one fact about many of the AEGEE-congresses lately,
 that bothers me and many others as well:
 It is not in the line of our AEGEE-tradition to ask 13 ecus for a
 European Night! It is very sad if, as it happened in Heidelberg, those
 who cannot afford to pay this amount of money do not participate in the
 party. Even if a meal is included the prize is too high, because meals
 are to be provided by the organizers. Another thing is, that there
 should be enough to eat for all. It is not correct to tell participants
 that a buffet is being served for just a 100 people and the others are
 supposed to take care for their meals themselves. In Heidelberg after
 some discussions this problem was partly solved but a disturbed feeling
 and empty pockets remained.
 In order to avoid little things disturbing the good impression of
 future congresses we all should strive to return to the good old
 AEGEE-principle that visitors to AEGEE-events should only have to pay
 for travelling-costs, very often high enough for just a short weekend-
 trip.

1. Why are environmental protection and pollution control themes which should be of concern to a group like EGEE?

- 1.1 Today's youth will be affected most by the future impact of today's mistakes.
- 1.2 Environmental problems are international and therefore European problems. Sensible solutions cannot be reached on a national level.
- 1.3 The existing environmental groups have not concentrated enough attention on the chances of European environmental policy.
- 1.4 The roots of the European community are based on economic interests. The idea of a common European environmental policy is comparatively new. These developments have to be regarded and controlled by the public. Therefore the public has to be informed and their interest supported as well as stimulated.

2. What are the differences between EGEE and existing environmental groups?

The ENWG will work in a field which has not yet been covered by any existing group. So we have to be aware of our differences to them and the possibilities which arise out of this differences.

- 2.1 Our structure, designed for European cooperation.
- 2.2 Our intention, to unite Europeans youth by working on European matters.
- 2.3 Our aim, to promote interest in issues of European importance.
- 2.4 Our interest, to understand how European policy works.

3. What are the aims of an EGEE ENVIRONMENTAL WORKING GROUP (ENWG)?

The members of the ENWG will inform themselves and the public about the interaction of environmental concerns between regional, national and the European levels. The final intention will be to support an improving policy containing the most progressive achievements of the single regions.

In order to approach this vast aims, the work should be split up into the following steps:

- 3.1 Every single group will adapt one specific environmental problem, collect all available information about it and observe the development.
- 3.2 Each group will analyse the interaction between the regional, the national and the European level in relation to their chosen environmental problem.
- 3.3 After collecting information on specific examples of environmental policy, the groups will exchange and summarize their gathered information and distribute it amongst the EGEE members but also the public.
- 3.4 A congress will be organized where all groups provide a store of information about their specific environmental subject, present their observations and results and talk about the evaluation of already existing adequate policies.

As has been shown in other areas of environmental policy, the intervention of the public can change things - this is particularly true of environmental protection. It will be the duty of the ENWG to stimulate and activate the public opinion on European environmental policy.

Dear Europeans,

You already received information about the idea behind the "Environmental Week". Since we intend to launch an Environmental Working Group simultaneously we present you some further ideas about the aims of this group. Nevertheless at this moment the work for the "Environmental Week" is more important, perhaps you will undertake some of the ideas mentioned on page 2 to realize this project in your city.

These ideas may be seen as a background for the whole project. However, the strength of EGEE is its unconventional way of working, so it is your task to find some activities which will attract the public really!!

Here are some ideas about possible activities:

- cleaning the pedestrian side,
- bathing in dirty water among the public,
- using gas masks while distributing flyers,
- ask school-kids to collect waste in the wood and show it to the public,
- organize workshops in front of important buildings,
- build up a hill of waste showing the amount of waste, one household produces every year, ...

The main idea of the environmental week is to show to the public that environmental problems also exist in other countries, at the same time, on similar fields. To proof this, we will organize the environmental week on the European level:

1. The first three days (23.1 - 25.1) you will organize some local activities, as attractive as possible. Try to get some reports on it in your local newspaper. Involve the citizens, your politicians, the existing environmental groups, your local industry

3. On Thursday afternoon you will receive all information of the EGEE activities of that week in whole Europe. So schedule your European activities after Thursday afternoon.

This program can only be effective, if Antennae from all over Europe participate.

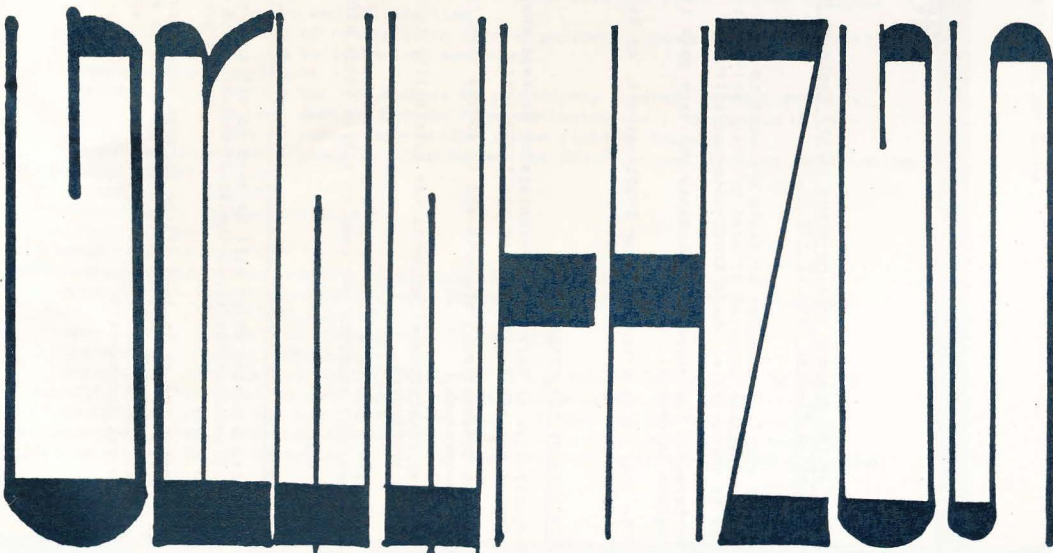

For the last 3-4 years we have been recognizing several processes in Europe which seemed to be independent, but in reality they influence each other: first of all the strengthening western european integration, second "perestroika" and "glasnot" in the East, which means less influence of communistic ideology and increasing people's wishes for more freedom and democracy, and third the remarkable process of Helsinki (CSCE, more confidence and arms reduction talks). All this resulted in a process of rising influence and diminishing power of the two " superpowers " onto their european allies. So now we are facing a totally new situation in Europa wich is scratching, at the fundamental basics of the " postwar-Europe " (divided into two systems, blocs).

Europe- and specially Western Europe- has become more independant from the superpowers. We are building our internal market towards 1992, we are taking the first little steps towards a real european currency union, so we make our own european policy. And I think Western Europe is able and wishing to defend itself with less U.S-american troops here.

The more cooperation we have among us in Western Europe and the more we have better relations to the eastern countries of our continent, the more Europe can play its own role in the world affairs independant from the U.S point of view.

In the last 40 years we needed the U.S- troops as our defenders, because we are too weak to defend us against soviet-russ aggression without help. But now, especially after Mr. Gorbachev came to power, can you imagine a third World War starting in Europe? Another point is that I think, Gorbachev will never let Hungary or Poland leave the Warsaw Pact; before U.S- american military presence has not been reduced at least a bit in Western Europe.

Last not least, I suppose AEGEE has a secret supporter sitting in the White House in Washington. The way how Mr. Bush is in favour of a United Europe (remember his recent speeches in Mainz, Warsaw and Budapest !) let me come to the conclusion that we should invite him to one of our next congresses.

 - Groningen : invite foreign students on drink of Antenna now and then
 - Lyon/Maastricht : don't work on Erasmus
 - Rotterdam : "passively"; giving opportunity to foreign students to become a member and visit events
 - Utrecht : welcomeparty beginning of the year for foreign students, plans how to inform local students, pressuregroup on university as member of group in which many studentassociations take part, take part in "buddy-system"; student who cares about one specific Eras.student
 4. Plans for next year ?
 - AEGEE-Aachen : publishing a book about "Euro-exchange"; Erasmus and university-cooperation
 - Amsterdam : continue social integration, spread more info to local students
 - Groningen/Rotterdam : -
